Origin of the virus

 Initial source of infection Migrating ducks or other waterfowl

Spread by aerosol, shared drinking water, fomites


To other migratory waterfowl, domestic poultry and pigs, pet birds

Virus found in respiratory secretions and feces

Avian Influenza

- Incubation period: 3-14 days
- · Birds found dead Drop in egg production
- Neurological signs
- Depression, anorexia, ruffled feathers
- Combs swollen, cyanotic Conjunctivitis and respiratory signs






Post Mortem Lesions

- Lesions may be absent with sudden death
- Severe congestion of the musculature
 Dehydration
- Subcutaneous edema
 of head and neck area





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

Q. Can I get avian influenza from eating poultry or eggs?

 A. No. Poultry and eggs that are properly prepared and cooked are safe to eat. In addition to proper processing, proper handling and cooking of poultry provides protection from viruses and bacteria, including avian influenza. As we remind consumers each and everyday, three are four basic food safety steps to follow: CLEAN, SEPARATE, COOK, and CHILL

Summer Heat

- Summer heat is probably the bigger concern in Kansas.
- A Cornish Rock Cross meat chicken, will be stressed in temperatures starting at 80°f at the end of their growth cycle.
- The biggest heat source in the summer is the roof of the coop and this is where many coop designs are weak.
- Every coop should include a layer of rigid foam between the trusses and roofing material.

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




















Moving Coops


- Small poultry flocks can easily be moved from place to place with coop on skids or wheels
- · Chickens are very destructive to their range area
- Consider plans that have outdoor runs that can be easily moved along with the house
- Parasites will begin to building up in the soil, but moving the pen from time to time may reduce the bird's exposure.
- A moveable coop also allows you to seek shady areas in the summer or protection from harsh winters.

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Tip #5 – Don't Overbuild!!! Many small flock housing designs seem overly complicated. Build a small coop by trial and error. An unwritten rule should be that salvaged materials must be included! · Old doors, windows pulled from a house, vents, etc. make good poultry house materials. Just be sure that salvaged items are free of lead

paint and asbestos that may have been used long ago.





















Getting the Most Eggs from your Poultry Flock













Thin, runny eggs? Could be age, hot temps, or a need to molt

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How to Molt

- Force Molt: Remove feed
- Natural Molt: turn off lights





Natural Molt

- On the longest day of the year, pull the plug on your artificial lights (June 21)
- Around Kansas State Fair time, or when you see significant feather drop, feed henscratch
- About 4-6 weeks after you see the feather drop, return to layer feed
- You can either use no lights and wait till Feb/Mar for eggs, or you can turn your lights back to 16 hours total per day

Molting Ideas

- Will not lay during molt great time to worm them!
- Molt once per year every fall
- Do NOT molt your new pullets or spring chicks, get them laying and keep them laying until the $2^{\rm nd}$ June 21
- If you plan to show fall birds keep lights at 16 hours until the show
- Never force molt in winter

- White eggs

- Not show breeds

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Production Browns

- Brown eggs
- Hybrids lay good numbers
- Eat a bit more feed than leghorns
- OK in hot weather
- Not show birds
- They are pets
- BEWARE of what you get in 2025!!!

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"I bought vaccinated chicks"

- Probably Marek's Disease
- Usually ONLY Marek's Disease
 If hybrid Cornish or layers,
 vaccinated could be for 1-2
 additional vaccines since they
 are vaccinated in ovo
- are vaccinated in ovo • There are many many more vaccines than Marek's!







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Standard Vaccines

- 1.Marek's Disease
- 2.Infectious Bronchitis 3.Newcastle Disease
- 4.Infectious Bursal Disease (Gumboro)
- 5.Fowl Pox
- 6.Avian Encephalomyelitis
- 7. Mycoplasma gallisepticum
- 8.Laryngotracheitis
- 9.Salmonella (specific strains like Salmonella Enteritidis **10.NOT AVIAN FLU**

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The New Vet Directive Eliminated OTC Anitbiotics

- Your personal vet *may* give you a broad spectrum antibiotic if they are your family or farm vet
- There are no antibiotics at the farm supply store, even if it claims to be an antibiotic
- Most local vets have little experience with poultry
- It becomes a matter of what the value is of the flock, or an individual bird
- Many let them 'self vaccinate' then move on

Biosecurity! Biosecurity! **Biosecurity!**

- · Don't buy and sell -EVER
- Keep wild birds out
- Keep waterfowl away
- Keep birds in good health with good care and feed
